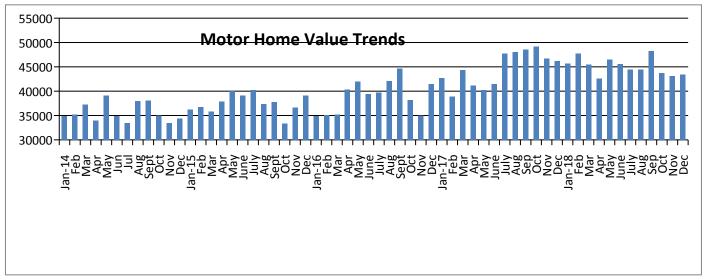
RV Values Hold Steady

"We are solidly into winter nov

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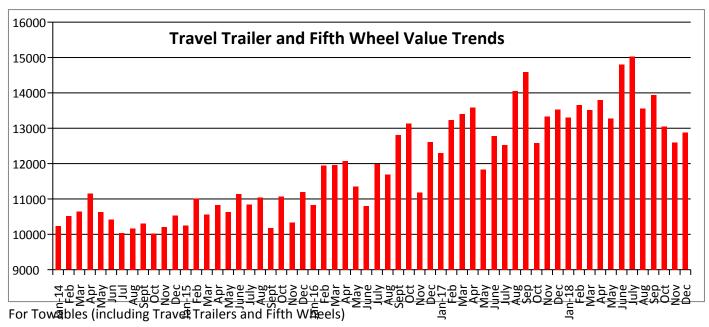

For Motor Homes (including Class A, B, and C)

- Average selling price was \$43,435 up \$303 (0.7%) from the previous month
- One year ago, the average selling price was \$46,135
- Auction volume was down 5% from the previous month. The average model year was 2010.



- Average selling price was \$12,872, up \$279 (2.2%) from the previous month
- One year ago, the average selling price was \$13,533
- Auction volume was down 19% from the previous month. The average model year was 2012.
